WHAT IS THE BEST TIME TO CHARTER A YACHT IN TAHITI?

The season in Polynesia is divided into two distinct seasons: dry and wet. The winter season spans May to October and is characterized by balmy temperatures and less humidity. From November to April, which is the summertime period, expect hot and humid weather and frequent rain spells.

The number of yachts available for charter in Tahiti is limited. In all cases, it is advisable to book at least 6 months in advance to avoid missing out on your preferred dates or vessel.

The terms yacht charter and boat rental are synonyms used to describe sailboat or motor yacht renting. For Fiji charter holidays, most yacht charters span 6 nights/7 days. All the charter prices adjust the exchange rate fluctuation.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR YACHT CHARTER SEASON IN TAHITI


As of February 10th, 2022, French Polynesia is accepting only fully vaccinated visitors that have received their booster shot. For more updated information, please navigate to the official website [here](#). The maritime borders of French Polynesia have been closed for all cruise ships and vessels since March 2020. In recent years, flights to and from Tahiti have been operating through Hawaii or Los Angeles. Direct flights from New Zealand and Australia are set to resume in July 2022.

Papeete, the capital, is the official entry port for all procedures and documentation in French Polynesia.

RAIATEA

This is the second largest of the Society Islands after Tahiti and is considered the heart of Polynesian culture. There are a few marinas here, including Uturoa and Baie Faaroa that accommodate the various sailing yachts that enter its shore. Raiatea is less developed in terms of luxury resorts offering a more calm and relaxed experience. The site of Marae Taputapuatea Raiatea on the southeastern coast of the island is an important archaeological site. Mount Temehani, an extinct volcano, is another option for keen hikers that wish to enjoy the view from above.



BORA BORA

Known as one of the most romantic getaways on the planet, Bora Bora is a paradise on earth for sailing enthusiasts and yacht charters. For those looking for an adventure, snorkeling and diving expeditions near vibrant coral are always an option as is swimming with sharks or turtles.



TAHA'A

Taha'a is where 80% of Tahitian vanilla is grown but is also home to a rich underwater world and wonderful coral garden. This charming island is nudged between Raiatea and Bora Bora but receives far fewer visitors, meaning the island is for a select view to explore and enjoy. Ivory beaches frame the coast and offer secluded tranquility that will enchant every visitor.





HUAHINE

This mountainous island is home to one of the largest concentrations of Polynesian archaeological remains and its rich history dates back to at least the 9th century AD. Huahine, meaning “woman” or more specifically “pregnant woman” is due to the shape of the island, with Huahine Nui (Big Huahine) to the north and Huahine Iti (Little Huahine) to the south. While it’s impossible to get enough of the white sand beaches, there are plenty of other things to see and do during your time on Huahine. Here you will find Huahine’s Maeva Village to learn more about the history of the area and you can also hike to the summit of Mount Pohue for a chance to enjoy the view, abundance of natural beauty, and lush vegetation.
